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Методичні вказівки з дисципліни «Вступ до перекладознавства, для бакалаврів спеціальності “Переклад” спеціалізації “Англійська мова”.

Методичні рекомендації містять пояснювальну записку, плани семінарських занять, теми самостійного опрацювання, матеріали для аудиторної та позааудиторної самостійної роботи, питання для самоконтролю, зразки залікової контрольної роботи, список літератури.

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## Пояснювальна записка.

Сучасна реформа вищої освіти - це насамперед перехід від парадигми навчання до парадигми освіти та самоосвіти. Це передбачає орієнтацію на активні методи опанування знань, розвиток творчих здібностей студентів, перехід від поточного до індивідуалізованого навчання з урахуванням потреб і можливостей певного студента. Тому окрім лекційних та практичних занять важливою формою навчального процесу стає самостійна робота студентів.

*Мета* самостійної роботи студентів при вивченні дисципліни „Вступ до перекладознавства” полягає в розширенні їх теоретичних знань та практичних навичок в галузі теорії перекладознавства, а також в покращенні якості перекладу різноманітних матеріалів з урахуванням лексичних, синтаксичних, граматичних та прагматичні особливостей їх перекладу.

В якості *головних завдань* самостійної роботи студентів виділяються :

- підвищення ефективності навчання за рахунок додаткової системи вправ;
- забезпечення фонових знань, необхідних студенту для роботи у галузі усного та письмового перекладу;
- розвиток власне перекладацьких навичок та умінь.

Організація позааудиторної самостійної роботи студентів полягає у необхідності більш широкого огляду тематики курсу з використанням основної та допоміжної літератури, аналітичного осмислення теоретичного матеріалу, формуванні узагальнюючих висновків.

Оскільки самостійна робота повинна сприяти розвитку творчого потенціалу студента та реалізації професійних навичок, завдання мають як індивідуальний так і груповий характер. Практикуються такі форми самостійної роботи як: виконання додаткових завдань та опрацювання додаткових текстів, що закріплюють у студентів певний об'єм перекладознавчої лексики; аналітичний розгляд наукових публікацій; підготовка доповіді з певної теми чи проблеми перекладу; підготовка до рольової гри; переклад хрестоматійних текстів лінгвістичного характеру.

В цілому викладач повинен привчати майбутніх спеціалістів з перекладознавства працювати професійно, самостійно, швидко і якісно удосконалювати свою кваліфікацію. Таким є соціальне замовлення суспільства системі освіти сьогодні. Воно продиктоване не тільки повсякденними потребами в постійному підвищенні якості підготовки спеціаліста, але й більш глобальним соціальним завданням – привести стан освіти у відповідність до нових цілей удосконалення суспільства, всебічному розвитку особистості.

Методичні матеріали розраховані на 16 годин практичних занять (аудиторна самостійна робота) 18 годин самостійної роботи студентів ( позааудиторна робота).

**Методичні матеріали для аудиторної самостійної роботи.**

Вправа 1 Перекладіть текст про типи галузевого перекладу перекладу та прокоментуйте його.

### **Types of Translation**

Due to the continuing evolvement of the translation industry there are now certain terms used to define specialists translations that do not fall under a general category. This brief guide offers an explanation of some of the more common translation terms used.

#### **Administrative translation**

The translation of administrative texts. Although administrative has a very broad meaning, in terms of translation it refers to common texts used within businesses and organisations that are used in day to day management. It can also be stretched to cover texts with similar functions in government.

#### **Commercial translation**

Commercial translation or business translation covers any sort of document used in the business world such as correspondence, company accounts, tender documents, reports, etc. Commercial translations require specialist translators with knowledge of terminology used in the business world.

#### **Computer translation**

Not to be confused with CAT, computer assisted translations, which refer to translations carried out by software. Computer translation is the translation of anything to do with computers such as software, manuals, help files, etc.

#### **Economic translation**

Similar to commercial or business translation, economic translation is simply a more specific term used for the translation of documents relating to the field of economics. Such texts are usually a lot more academic in nature.

#### **Financial translation**

Financial translation is the translation of texts of a financial nature. Anything from banking to asset management to stocks and bonds could be covered.

#### **General translation**

A general translation is the simplest of translations. A general text means that the language used is not high level and to a certain extent could be in layman's terms. There is no specific or technical terminology used. Most translations carried out fall under this category.

#### **Legal translation**

Legal translations are one of the trickiest translations known. At its simplest level it means the translation of legal documents such as statutes, contracts and treaties.

A legal translation will always need specialist attention. This is because law is culture-dependent and requires a translator with an excellent understanding of both the source and target cultures.

Most translation agencies would only ever use professional legal to undertake such work. This is because there is no real margin for error; the mistranslation of a passage in a contract could, for example, have disastrous consequences.

When translating a text within the field of law, the translator should keep the following in mind. The legal system of the source text is structured in a way that suits

that culture and this is reflected in the legal language; similarly, the target text is to be read by someone who is familiar with another legal system and its language.

### **Literary translation**

A literary translation is the translation of literature such as novels, poems, plays and poems.

The translation of literary works is considered by many one of the highest forms of translation as it involves so much more than simply translating text. A literary translator must be capable of also translating feelings, cultural nuances, humour and other subtle elements of a piece of work.

Some go as far as to say that literary translations are not really possible. In 1959 the Russian-born linguist Roman Jakobson went as far as to declare that "poetry by definition [was] untranslatable". In 1974 the American poet James Merrill wrote a poem, "Lost in Translation," which in part explores this subject.

### **Medical translation**

A medical translation will cover anything from the medical field from the packaging of medicine to manuals for medical equipments to medical books.

## **Translation Theory and Practice**

Good theory is based on information gained from practice. Good practice is based on carefully worked-out theory. The two are interdependent.

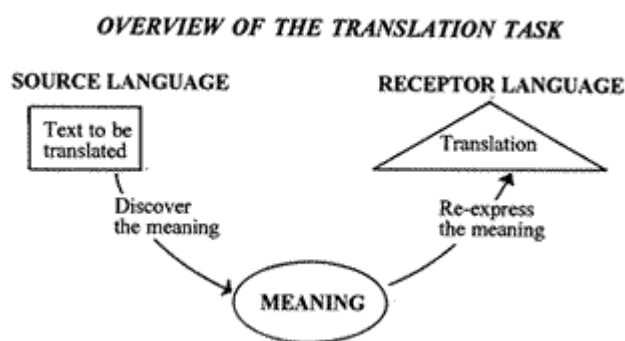
The ideal translation will be accurate as to meaning and natural as to the receptor language forms used. An intended audience who is unfamiliar with the source text will readily understand it. The success of a translation is measured by how closely it measures up to these ideals.

The ideal translation should be...

- Accurate: reproducing as exactly as possible the meaning of the source text.
- Natural: using natural forms of the receptor language in a way that is appropriate to the kind of text being translated.
- Communicative: expressing all aspects of the meaning in a way that is readily understandable to the intended audience.

Translation is a process based on the theory that it is possible to abstract the meaning of a text from its forms and reproduce that meaning with the very different forms of a second language.

Translation, then, consists of studying the lexicon, grammatical structure, communication situation, and cultural context of the source language text, analyzing it in order to determine its meaning, and then reconstructing this same meaning using the lexicon and grammatical structure which are appropriate in the receptor language and its cultural context.

In practice, there is considerable variation in the types of translations produced by translators. Some translators work only in two languages and are competent in both. Others work from their first language to their second language, and still others from their second language to their first language. Depending on these matters of language proficiency, the procedures used will vary from project to project.

### *What does an Interpreter do?*

Interpreting usually takes one of two forms:

- a) **Consecutive interpreting** ? here the interpreter listens to a section of speech then either summarises it or relays the gist. This is more useful for one-to-one meetings and small groups.
- b) **Simultaneous interpreting** ? the interpreter attempts to relay the meaning in real time. Naturally there is a small delay while the interpreter processes information. This type of interpreting is used more in conferences and tele/video conferences. It should be kept in mind that the nature of this work requires specialist equipment if the client does not wish for "whispering interpreting?". In addition, if you require this service for a whole day it will be necessary to source at least two interpreters due to the mental fatigue experienced by the work.

### **Types of texts.**

Early text linguists concentrated on the development of various paradigms for the study of how sentences interconnect. They have drawn attention to the various linguistic devices that can be used to ensure that a text "hangs together" the concept of textual cohesion.

Such devices include the use of articles, lexical repetition and personal pronouns to refer back to entities the use of linking words to establish a particular logical relationship of, say, contrast, concession or addition between two or more sentences in a text. Other types text linguistic themes include: developing a typology of text types such as written text types

*The most commonly known classification is that typological variation can be reduced to 5 functional types: argumentative texts, narrative texts, descriptive texts, expository texts and instructive texts. In some versions of this theory, the 5 types tend to be viewed as textualisation-strategies. ( Expository text is a text which explains something. A descriptive text is a text which lists the characteristics of something. A narrative text is an account of events.)*

It is not uncommon for a single text to incorporate parts which fall under different functional headings (for instance, a novel may consist of descriptive, narrative and argumentative episodes; a newspaper editorial is likely to contain narrative and argumentative parts). From libraries and bookshops to advertisement posters, from newspapers text is everywhere. We can study the structure of the text in terms of the flow of elements which follow a temporary sequence (narrative analysis), or in terms of the logic/persuasive structure of assertions in order to convince an audience about a claimed truth (argumentation and rhetoric analysis).

If we intend text as a communication of a message, we can systematically analyse its content (content analysis) or the interaction of different actors involved (discourse analysis). Finally, we can refer to the vast cultural/social context of meanings from which text emerges (semiotics analysis). Narrative analysis deals with how tellers interpret real events into narrative: what is the focus of the analysis is how narrators structure perceptual experience, organise their memory, rebuild events of life assigning, reordering and reshaping meanings. What is interesting is the way in which various elements, protagonists, times of the story are ordered and systematised. All this furnishes precious information about the subjective perspective of the narrator, about the context on which meanings are grounded, about values that narrator wants to emphasise and those he/she wants to conceal.

What includes narrative? Personal experiences, novels, poems as well. A problem arises when we try to define possible different types of narrative. We, however, often pose this question 'what is text analysis?' and the answer will be: 'it is a technique designed to analyse text and draw conclusions as to the linguistics and stylistic structures of a given text.' Next question will be: 'What is a text?'

Text is to be considered as any piece of written or spoken language designed to be understood. The importance of text analysis at any early stage lies in the extent to which text can be analysed and categorized in terms of reader expectancy.

Вправа 5. Прочитайте визначення омонімів на українській мові та наведіть власні приклади омонімів на англійській мові.

### **ОМОНИМИ**

**Омоніми** (від гр. *homos* - однаковий і *онума* - ім'я) - це слова, які мають однакове значення і написання, але зовсім різні значення.

Напр., *потяг* - "поїзд" у значенні "ряд з'єднаних між собою залізничних вагонів, що рухаються за допомогою локомотива" і *потяг* - "настійне прагнення до чогось чи когось".

Омоніми можуть бути **повними** та **неповними**.

**Повні лексичні омоніми** - це слова, що тотожні за звуковим складом і написанням у всіх граматичних формах:

- *коса* - заплетене довге волосся;
- *коса* - вузька наливна смуга суходолу в озері, морі чи річці;
- *коса* - сільськогосподарське знаряддя.

**Неповні лексичні омоніми** розподіляються на **омоформи**, **омофони** і **омографи**.

**Омоформи** (граматичні омоніми) - це слова, які збігаються за звучанням та написанням лише в окремих граматичних формах :

- *діти* - куди вас *діти*;
- *коса* - іменник і *коса* (лінія) - прикметник жіночого роду;
- *три* - наказовий спосіб дієслова і *три* - числівник.

**Омофони** (фонетичні омоніми) - це слова, які збігаються лише за звучанням, а пишуться неоднаково: *мріяти* і *мрія ти*; *сонце* - чи не сон це?

**Омографи** - це слова, що збігаються за написанням, але розрізняються за написанням і наголосом: *малб* дитина - не *мбла* щастя; *плачэ* і *плбчу*; *замук* і *збмок*.

Слова-омоніми в сучасній мові нічого спільного у значенні між собою не мають (напр., *склад* - як фонетична одиниця мови і *склад* - як приміщення).

Вправа 6. Прочитайте визначення паронімів на українській мові та наведіть власні приклади омонімів на англійській мові.

### ПАРОНІМИ

**Пароніми** (від гр. *para* - поблизу, *poruch* і *oputa* - ім'я) - це слова, подібні між собою за звучанням і частково за будовою: *абонент* - *абонемент*; *континент* - *контингент*.

За допомогою паронімів нерідко створюються рими в авторських поетичних творах та в народних прислів'ях та приказках:

*Говорили- балакали, сіли й заплакали; Ні слуху ні духу; Яке їхало, таке й здибало.*

Вправа 7. Прочитайте визначення іншомовних слів на українській мові та напишіть подібний текст на англійській мові про іншомовні слова в американському варіанті та британському варіанті англійської мови.

### ІНШОМОВНІ СЛОВА

Біля 10 відсотків слів української мови - це слова іноземного походження, які "прописалися" в українській мові або прямо, або через мову - посередницю у різні часи.

Це - слова, запозичені з *грецької* (*кипарис*, *комета*, *лиман*, *корабель*, *математика*, *логіка*, *література*), *латинської* (*форма*, *студент*, *академія*, *ректор*, *персона*, *комедія*, *дисципліна*), *старослов'янської* (*приязнь*, *град*, *прах*,



брань, злато, благодать), тюрських мов (халва, батіг, вежа, кавун, базар, сарай).

Багато в українській мові слів французького походження (бюро, асамблея, сюжет, пляж), англійського (клоун, лідер, аут, пікнік, джентельмен), німецького (дах, трунт, кокс, штраф, курорт), італійського (кортик, тенор, сопрано, галера, корсар), голандського (краби, яхта, трап, люк), іспанського (сомбреро, фієста) та інших мов.

Вправа 8. Перекладіть текст про імплікатуру тексту та прокоментуйте його.

In linguistics, **implicature** is the relationship between two statements where the truth of one *suggests* the truth of the other, but—distinguishing implicature from entailment—does not *require* it. For example, the sentence "*Mary had a baby and got married*" strongly *suggests* that Mary had the baby before the wedding, but the sentence would still be *strictly true* if Mary had her baby after she got married. Further, if we add the qualification "*— not necessarily in that order*" to the original sentence, then the implicature is *cancelled* even though the meaning of the original sentence is not altered.

This can be contrasted with cases of entailment. For example, the statement "*The president was assassinated*" not only *suggests* that "*The president is dead*" is true, but *requires* that it be true. The first sentence could not be true if the second were not true; if the president were not dead, then whatever it is that happened to him would not have counted as a (successful) *assassination*. Similarly, unlike implicatures, entailments cannot be *cancelled*; there is no qualification that one could add to "*The president was assassinated*" which would cause it to cease entailing "*The president is dead*" while also preserving the meaning of the first sentence.

In linguistics, **entailment** is the relationship between two sentences where the truth of one (A) requires the truth of the other (B).

For example, the sentence (A) *The president was assassinated*. entails (B) *The president is dead*.

Entailment differs from implicature, where the truth of one (A) suggests the truth of the other (B), but does not require it.

For example, the sentence (A) *Mary had a baby and* (B) *got married* implicates that (A) she had a baby before (B) the wedding, but this is cancellable by adding -- *not necessarily in that order*. Entailments are not cancellable.

## 2. Вправи для самостійної позааудиторної роботи з дисципліни.

Система вправ має забезпечити наявність у свідомості студента: 1) відповідних фонових знань; 2) термінологічних еквівалентів з тематики електричного та електронного устаткування широкого вжитку, офісного обладнання, комп'ютерних технологій; 3) здатність виконувати перекладацькі дії на автоматизму; 4) відповідних знань стосовно перекладу складних термінів, аббревіатур та скорочень.

Вправа 1. Перекладіть політичні неологізми Великобританії та прокоментуйте їх.

**Chindia** is a portmanteau neologism that refers to China and India together in general, and their economies in particular. The credit of coining the now popular term goes to leading Indian economist and politician Jairam Ramesh.

**Dog-whistle politics** is a term used to describe a type of political campaigning or speechmaking using coded language, which appears to mean one thing to the general population but which has a different or more specific meaning for a targeted subgroup of the audience. It is usually used pejoratively by those that do not approve of the tactics. The term is thought to have been introduced to the United Kingdom by Lynton Crosby, where it played a role in the 2005 general election; Michael Howard was often accused of practising "dog-whistle politics" on contentious subjects like immigration, with a campaign slogan that asked "Are you thinking what we're thinking?".

**Fauxtography** (2006) The 2006 Israel-Lebanon conflict photographs controversies refers to allegations that some instances of photojournalism from the 2006 Israel-Lebanon conflict misrepresented scenes of death and destruction in Lebanon caused by Israeli air attacks. The controversy began as an investigation of documents by individual bloggers, most of them American political conservatives, and then spread to print and television media sources. It led to the Reuters news organization firing one of its freelance photographers, Adnan Hajj, and implementing stricter controls on its photo-gathering process. Four types of misleading photojournalism have been alleged as part of the controversy: photo manipulation using computer software, photo staging by press photographers, photo staging by others at the scene, and false or misleading captioning of unstaged photos. The media watchdog group CAMERA claims that the distortions reflect a bias in favor of Hezbollah and against Israel and the Israel Defense Forces.

**Corporatocracy** (sometimes **corporocracy**) is a neologism coined by proponents of the Global Justice Movement to describe a government bowing to pressure from corporate entities.

**Megacorp** is a term popularized by William Gibson derived from the combination of the prefix mega- with an abbreviation of the word corporation. It has become a term popularly used in cyberpunk literature. It refers to a corporation that is a massive conglomerate, holding monopolistic or near-monopolistic control over multiple markets

**Crony capitalism** is a pejorative term describing an allegedly capitalist economy in which success in business depends on an extremely close relationship between the businessman and the state institutions of politics and government, rather than by the equitable concepts of the free market, open competition, and economic liberalism. It may be exhibited by favoritism in the distribution of legal permits, government grants, special tax breaks, and so forth.

Crony capitalism arises when political cronyism spills over into the world of business, and the relationships between powerful businessmen and powerful politicians form a kind of aristocratic social hierarchy, influenced by self-serving friendships and family ties, to the extent that it corrupts public-serving economic and political ideals.

Вправа 2 Перекладіть неологізми, що стосуються поп-культури, та прокоментуйте їх.

A **blog** is a user-generated website where entries are made in journal style and displayed in a reverse chronological order.

Blogs often provide commentary or news on a particular subject, such as food, politics, or local news; some function as more personal online diaries. A typical blog combines text, images, and links to other blogs, web pages, and other media related to its topic. The ability for readers to leave comments in an interactive format is an important part of many blogs. Most blogs are primarily textual although some focus on photographs (*photoblog*), *sketchblog*, *videos (vlog)*, or *audio (podcasting)*, and are part of a wider network of social media.

**Jumping the shark** is a metaphor that was originally used to denote the tipping point at which a TV series is deemed to have passed its peak, or has introduced plot twists that are illogical in terms of everything that has preceded them. Once a show has "jumped the shark", fans sense a noticeable decline in quality or feel the show has undergone too many changes to retain its original charm. Jump-the-shark moments are typically scenes that finally convince viewers that the show has fundamentally and permanently strayed from its original premise.

**Queercore** is a cultural and social movement that began in the mid 1980's as an offshoot of punk. It is distinguished by a discontent with society in general.

**Wardrobe malfunction** is a euphemism used to describe the accidental exposure of an intimate part or parts of the body due to a defect in an article or articles of clothing. Most famously, it was used by Justin Timberlake to explain the Super Bowl XXXVIII halftime show controversy, a 1 February 2004 incident in which the

malfunction resulted in what was claimed to be the unintentional baring of most of Janet Jackson's right breast.

Вправа 3 Перекладіть неологізми, що стосуються лінгвістики, та прокоментуйте їх.

A **backronym** or **bacronym** is a type of acronym that begins as an ordinary word, and is later interpreted as an acronym. The word "backronym" is a portmanteau of *back* (see back-formation) and *acronym*. The term is also used for a new set of words put to an existing acronym (e.g. "advanced research projects agency" → ".arpa" → "address and routing parameters area"). Backronyms have also been referred to as *anachronyms*, a pun on anachronism to designate a term that has been retrospectively made into an acronym, but this usage is now quite uncommon.

Examples.

(1) *Golf* is not an acronym for "Gentlemen Only, Ladies Forbidden" as has been suggested. It is actually derived from the Scottish name for the game, *gowf*.

(2) *Bimbo* has been interpreted to mean "**B**ody **i**mpressive, **b**rain **o**ptional"

(3) The word "*wiki*" from the Hawaiian word meaning "quick" Since its application to consumer generated media, some have suggested that "wiki" means "What I Know Is".

(4) *IBM* "I've been moved", used among IBM employees because of the frequent position changes within the company

**Snowclone** is a neologism used to describe a type of formula-based cliché which uses an old idiom in a new context. It was originally defined as "a multi-use, customizable, instantly recognizable, time-worn, quoted or misquoted phrase or sentence that can be used in an entirely open array of different jokey variants by lazy journalists and writers."<sup>[1]</sup>

The term emphasizes the use of a familiar (and often particular) formula and previous cultural knowledge of the reader to express information about an idea. The idea being discussed is usually contextually different in meaning from the original use of that formula, but can be understood using the same trope as the original formulation.

A common example of a snowclone is "X is the new Y", a generic form of the original expression "pink is the new black". In order to apply the snowclone, X and Y should be substituted with new words or phrases For instance, this snowclone might appear as "Random is the New Order".

Examples.

(1) All your **X** are belong to us. (Original: "All Your Base Are Belong To Us", an internet meme) All your brains are belong to us.

(2) Have **X**, will travel. (Original: *Have Gun — Will Travel*, the title of old US TV western, or the vaudeville phrase "have tux, will travel") Have dead presidents- will travel.

(3) To **X**, or not to **X**? (Original: "To be, or not to be" from *Hamlet*) To beer or not to beer?

(4) Will **X** for **Y**. (Original: "Will work for food") Will sell for \$100.

(5)What happens in **X**, stays in **X**. (Original: "What happens in Vegas, stays in Vegas") What happens in our company, stays in our company.

Вправа 4. Перекладіть архаїзми Великобританії та прокоментуйте їх.

This is a **list of archaic English words and their modern equivalents**. These words and spellings are now considered archaic or obsolescent within the current status of the English language. Given both the rapidity of change in modern English and the number of versions used by nations and cultures, it should be borne in mind that dates are approximate and that the information here may not apply to all versions of English.

Poutine - a very tasty but unpleasant- looking dish of melting cheese curds and gravy on chips.

Tipis (sometimes also known as tee-pees) – conical dwellings of animal skins stretched over wooden poles.
